




Once you have registered you will be able to go on to the SIMS Options Online website to complete your choices.




Why take History at GCSE?

64% of pupils achieving a grade 9-4





What will I study?





















Term 1 – Production

During the first term of year 9 all music and drama students will be involves on putting on a production. This may be musical theatre show or a mixture of different items. You can get involved as a performer on stage, musician in the band or working on sound engineering / technical aspects behind the scenes.



Am I suitable?

- The main requirement for this course is that you have a genuine and broad interest in music of all types and are happy to listen to and study music outside your comfort zone.
- Ideally you need to be learning an instrument or a competent singer and be having additional instrumental or vocal lessons. If you want to start you will be given priority and a fixed time at the start of year 9.
- It helps to be able to read music or tab/drum notation, but it's not essential. If you can't yet but are keen and willing to start learning then that's fine and can be to a relatively simple level if necessary.
- The composing elements are not as daunting as they might seem you can create music on different software or record yourself or others playing.
- Music students are expected to support the music extra-curricular ensembles and performances within and outside school.















Will I enjoy it?

You will enjoy the course if you...

- Like listening to and learning about different styles of music.
- Enjoy practical, creative activities.
- Like working independently and with others.
- Are keen to develop you skill as a performer on voice or an instrument.
- Enjoy creating your own pieces of music or are keen to start.

What support will I get?

- Music students are given priority for music tuition in school and will have fixed instrumental lessons to avoid them clashing with other subjects.
- Coursework tutorials are offered after school along with revision sessions in year 11.
- Theory sessions are offered for pupils working towards grade 5 on an instrument.
- The cost of music lessons, resources and trips can be supported for pupils from lower income households.

Where can it lead?

- Studying music in years 9-11 is recommended to continue studying music at A level or a related course such as music technology, music performance or performing arts.
- Music GCSE would be beneficial, if not essential, for all careers related to music from studio recording, music management, publishing, journalism, performing and many more jobs in the music industry.
- Music will help you 'stand out' in any future choices as not many pupils take it.
- Showing you have an interest and dedication to learning an instrument demonstrates you have many important personal skills such as commitment, creativity and the ability to work with others.


