What should students be doing in the ISA for Sociology?

Revising content

- Review notes from a recent class. This should be done little and often. This can take the form
 of ensuring notes are complete in enough detail or identifying areas of difficult content and
 using an effective revision method. (flashcards/mind map/Cornell).
- Complete your booklets for each unit, use the resources on Teams to help.
- Add your key studies to your studies book. Outline the findings of the study and how they can support Sociological ideas.
- Revise content from an earlier part of the course. Use our RAG checklists (all on teams/in your progress booklets) to identify areas of concern and prioritise these. Use effective methods of revision to develop these key areas.
- Revision guides are available to use alongside class notes, copies in the ISA and S12.
- Use the 'Myrevisionnotes' free resources <u>here</u> for interactive quizzes and exam questions.
- Pick up your tracking progress booklet from S12, use the feedback you have been given to rewrite/redraft work.
- Research methods are fundamental in Social Sciences. Create 'Method Mind-Maps' to revise the key features and evaluation points.
- Use the OCR study guidance sheet to
- Create a glossary of definitions to use throughout the course.

Extending knowledge through extra reading/listening

- Use websites such as Sociology Guy and ReviseSociology and select a topic to revise.
- Pick up a Sociology review from S12 and select research articles to review, consolidate and extend your knowledge.
