What should students be doing in the ISA for Politics?

Revising content

- Review notes from a recent class. This should be done little and often.
 This can take the form of ensuring notes are complete in enough detail or identifying areas of difficult content and using an effective revision method. (flashcards/mind map/Cornell).
- Complete your booklets for each unit. All of the lessons come from the booklets. If you miss a lesson you need to ensure you have completed the relevant part of the booklet.
- Revise content from an earlier part of the course. Use our topic checklists
 (all on teams) to identify areas of concern and prioritise these. Use
 effective methods of revision to develop these key areas. Each part of the
 spec can be located on the inside cover of the topic booklets.
- Revision guides and flashcards are available to use alongside class notes, copies in S11.
- Use the Tutor 2U Politics section found <u>here</u> for quizzes and other activities.
- Pick up your essay tracking progress booklet from S11, use the feedback you have been given to rewrite/redraft work.
- Create a glossary of definitions to use throughout the course.

Extending knowledge through extra reading/listening

- Use the <u>Alan History Nerd</u> YouTube channel to help revise and consolidate your learning.
- Pick up a Politics Review magazine from S11 and select research articles related to your course. There are many additional reading articles and books available.

- Listen to the Podcast (weekly each Friday)
