The Sixth Form at St Alban's

In the last few weeks our Sixth Form leavers have started University courses across the UK and internationally, including music at Cambridge, medicine at Imperial College London and Birmingham, textile design at Norwich University of Arts, Architecture at Plymouth, Law at Manchester and many more. An impressive 87% gained a place at their first choice University, and 57% have entered STEM based courses. In particular this year we have a number of female students pursuing STEM courses, studying motor sport engineering at Oxford Brookes and studying electrical engineering at Loughborough for example, which we hope our younger students will find aspirational.

We are very proud of our 2020 Sixth Form results which are testimony to the hard work of our students. Our value added progress was **outstanding**, this means that individuals regardless of their starting points made excellent progress. Overall this summer 34% of A Level grades were A*-A and 61% of all grades were A*-B, individual achievements were from Shirley (A*, A*, A, A), Simon (A*, A*, A, C), Tom (A*, A*, A*, A), Andria (A*, A*, A*, A, A) and Marnie (A*, A*, A, A) who secured places at a number of Russell group universities. We congratulate all our young people for their enthusiasm and determination to succeed and thank the subject tutors for their inspiration and commitment.

We wish all our young people every blessing as they now begin the next chapter of their lives and look forward to hearing about their future achievements. On top of this teachers have been doing an amazing job of writing our references, which are equally important for our UCAS applications. Our Oxbridge and Medical School applicants are now finalising their applications as we draw near to the early applicant deadline, whilst many others are making good progress and will be looking to submit their applications in the coming weeks. The apprehension of waiting for decisions and the excitement I felt seeing my first offers is something that I look forward to going through and celebrating with my friends and peers once they start receiving offers too.

Hi, I'm Charlotte Codd and I am the Deputy Head Girl of St. Albans. I am currently studying A-Level Business, Music and English Literature alongside an EPQ and Cambridge Pre-U qualification and will hopefully further pursue a degree course in Business Marketing with Management or Business Law at University. Uniform and Appearance

As we continue through the school year, a reminder to all of our expectations on student uniform and appearance:

Our school uniform is as follows:

The following items can be ordered directly from Coes:
School blazer with badge*
Striped School tie with badge*
Dark green v-necked long-sleeve jumper
Tailored mid grey school trousers*

These items can purchased from any retail outlet:
Plain white shirt*
Black shoes*, not suede or fabric and no high boots
Black/grey socks
Waterproof coat for bad weather
Items marked with an * are compulsory.

Items that are not permitted are listed below:

- × Skirts
- Make-up (make-up natural to the student's complexion and skin tone is acceptable. However, any make up that does not comply with this such as lipstick, eye-shadow, eye-liner and false eyelashes are not allowed).
- × Nail varnish
- **x** Extreme hairstyles, including brightly coloured hair
- Nose studs
- **×** Eyebrow studs
- Earrings that are not a simple gold or silver stud
- ✗ Any jewellery that is not a cross
- × Trainers, unless for PE
- Shoes with logos on
- × Cord or denim trousers
- ✗ Skinny or tight trousers
- × Hoodies
- ✗ Hats including baseball caps



Mobile Phones and Headphones

Mobile phones are, for many of our students, a vital communication tool to ensure that they get to and from school safely. The ability to communicate with you as parents and carers is important and we recognise this. The rules for the use of these devices are that they should be put away and switched off when they arrive at the school grounds. If a student needs to get in contact with home there are mechanisms in place, either through the school office or Pastoral support staff.

There are times where mobile phones may be used for educational purposes in lessons, and in this event, it is at the discretion of the class teacher if they feel that this will enhance learning. At 3.15pm mobile phones are permitted to be used again as this may help with arranging pick-ups and lifts. Headphones can also become a distraction and now seem to be something of a fashion item, which can be very expensive. Again, once on the school grounds these are not permitted for use and should be kept away in students' bags.

Attendance

I know that some parents are concerned when their children are ill at the moment that it might be due to Coronavirus. Fortunately, here, so far, the vast majority of absences for coughs and temperatures have been due to other seasonal bugs. However, this has led to some parents erring on the side of caution but we encourage you minimise absences and if you receive a negative Covid-19 test result then please send your child back to school as soon as possible. We find that most children can cope with a day sitting in a warm classroom with a minor sniffle, headache or period-related discomfort after some non-prescription medication in the morning.

Attendance at St Alban's is high. We are proud of this and work hard to maintain it because usually the students who achieve their best in exams are those with good attendance.

Term-time holidays, trips abroad to visit family, extended school holidays, etc. will **not** authorised by the school. Unauthorised absences result in the issuing of fines to parents. A second such absence will not lead to a second fine but a referral for prosecution.

Regular attendance here means attending every school day, unless agreed otherwise by the school.

Be wary of a report on Mondays by your child of a minor complaint such as a headache or stomach upset. We have up to three times as many absences on Mondays as the other days. Often these seem more related to a desire to extend the weekend than genuine illness.

Well done to all our Year 7 students for settling in and becoming a strong part of our school community. To date the Year 7s have collected 2362 house points- a truly remarkable achievement! The students are really enjoying the added freedom of coming to secondary school including our proximity to the local shops! As the weeks have passed, we have noticed that there are many students making a trip to the shop in the morning and buying lots of sweets, crisps and sugary drinks and consuming these before school begins. We would like the students to be mindful of the both the quantity of these items being consumed but also the negative impact these can have on focus and learning, your support in this matter is appreciated. Just to confirm that students should not be bringing fizzy/caffeinated drinks into school and if seen, will be confiscated and disposed of.

As the friendships within the year group are becoming stronger, a reminder that students should be limiting contact with each other (no hugging, games involving touching etc.) to help prevent the spread of COVID-19. Please discuss this with your child and encourage the regular washing of hands and the use of sanitiser throughout the school day.
