Farewell


At the end of this term we say farewell to the following members of staff:

Attendance

Suffolk County Council have updated their policy and guidance regarding children missing from education and school attendance. Of particular note:

If you take your child abroad for an extended period in term-time, without authorisation from the school, then you may lose their place at the school. When you return to the UK, you will need to re-apply for a school place and you may not get your preferred school. Note that most Suffolk schools are full and this can mean a place is not immediately available. This has already been an issue for some parents; several families who went abroad before the end of the summer term lost their children's school places.

Suffolk County Council will now issue Fixed Penalty Notices for unauthorised absences, including term-time holidays, only once. If there is another such unauthorised absence in the future then it will mean a court appearance, with fines typically between £500 and £1000 per parent. This is to discourage parents who were building the £60 fines into their holiday budget or whose children regularly have unauthorised absences.

Student Behaviour on Buses

Mr Horne, Head of Pastoral Care and Designated Safeguarding Lead

We are currently working alongside Ipswich Buses to address issues of poor behaviour and safety concerns that have been raised by both drivers and members of the public. The real concern is that one of our students is going to get injured at some point, and the likelihood is that it could be very serious. Safety is a priority, and therefore student conduct whilst on public transport is really important so that everyone can enjoy their journey in safety, and the driver can focus on doing their job.

Members of the School Leadership Team will be monitoring students at Tower Ramparts in the mornings, and we will also be holding assemblies with the help of representatives from Ipswich Buses on how we can improve passenger safety.

YEAR 11 Student Achievement – December 2019

As we approach the end of term, I thought it appropriate to update parents of Year 11 students about our recent mock examinations. The rationale behind running these exams is to provide our students with an experience of the 'real' public examinations to be held in the summer term. We realise that for all our students this can be a challenging and stressful time coping with all the subjects being tested within a fixed time frame. I can assure you all that this will not be like this next summer as exams are separated over a much longer period of time running from May-June. As a requirement from the exam regulator JCQ all centres delivering public examinations must also factor in a contingency day which next year will be Wednesday 24 June 2020. If there is an emergency during the summer 2020 series, exams may be rescheduled up to and including this date. Therefore, all candidates both GCSE & A Level must be available until this day. Where candidates choose not to be available for a rescheduled examination(s) for reasons other than those traditionally covered by special consideration they will not be eligible for enhanced grading arrangements. As a school we are in the process of collecting data from the recent mock examinations and also additional Year 11 progress data. Our targets for the current cohort are both challenging but aspirational. We want to ensure that the young people in our care achieve the very best but also provide them with the best start for post 16 education. The mock results day will be on Monday 16th December during morning registration. Students will be provided with a breakdown of their results and the next steps are crucial to students needing to work with their subject teachers and parents to ensure they achieve their potential. The issue of attendance is crucial to any student if they are to achieve their target grades. I have provided a table below outlining the impact that lower attendance can have on their performance in the public examinations.

Our current Year 11 attendance target is 96.9% and at this point last year the Year 11 attendance was 96.6%.

Once we start back in the new term it is imperative that your son/daughter attends the exam support sessions run over a two-week timetable. Your support is vital in ensuring all students achieve their potential.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs Shemming and Mrs Carter, as well as our team of invigilators and support staff, who manage the mock exams during a busy time in our school calendar.

SECTION 48 - RELIGIOUS EDUCATION INSPECTION

In the past, Catholic schools have been open to government inspection of all aspects of their work other than simply Religious Education. Inspections were carried out by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools (HMI) who reported to the Secretary of State on the quality of education provided. The Education (Schools) Act 1992 transferred this responsibility to the Chief Inspector for England who heads the Office for Standards in Education (OFSTED). This was further ratified by the Education Act 2005 and the Education and Inspections Act 2007.

Under Section 48 of the Act, the governors of Catholic schools must now ensure that Religious Education is inspected at prescribed intervals. These are known as Section 48 Inspections.

The report on Religious Education (RE) is produced for the Bishop, who under Canon Law 804 and 806, has responsibility for schools in the diocese, and for the Governing Body of the schools concerned.

The day finished with a lunch in the staff room where Bishop Alan met with all members of staff.



Remembrance Day

This year the school focused their minds on the human endeavours of individuals during the last two great wars. Students and staff were told about the gallantry of Jan Jacewicz, who in recognition of his work flying for the Polish, French and English Air Forces he won 19 medals, one of which was the Vituti Militari- the Polish equivalent of the Victoria Cross. Jan was the second most highly decorated Polish flyer of the Second World War, a true war hero. His two granddaughters in Year 7 laid the wreath in his memory. Roses were also laid to remember the contribution made by citizens of different countries around the world.

Red Wednesday

Students and staff were invited to come into school wearing a visible item of red clothing. This was to highlight the thousands of Christians around the world who are persecuted for their faith. Students were invited to come and celebrate Mass on behalf of the millions who are denied that right.

CAFOD

In December the CAFOD Sixth Form leaders led assemblies highlighting the UN goal of Justice for all. Within the assembly Anagan 12JA gave a powerful testimony of what life was like as a refugee in Sri Lanka during the Civil War. Students were reminded that they could make a difference by supporting the Winter Market. It is their intention that we raise sufficient funds on that day to buy more water pumps so that access to clean water is available to more people.

Pat Swann Celebrates her 70th Birthday

Pat Swann has been a receptionist at St Albans Catholic High School in Ipswich for for 35 years and is celebrating her 70th birthday.

Adoring children made a giant fuss of a beloved school receptionist in Ipswich described as "like mum to everyone" as she turned 70 while still working at the academy.

Pat Swann started at St Albans Catholic High School in Ipswich 35 years ago, when it needed some cover for lunchtime supervisors.

She quickly fell in love with the Digby Road school, which her children had attended, for its "lovely" and "really caring atmosphere".

Later becoming a receptionist alongside her lunchtime duties, she quickly became a stalwart who youngsters say hello to every morning and even talk to about their problems.

Even though she is well beyond retirement age, Mrs Swann has no plans to retire because she loves working with the children at the school so much.



"It is just a lovely school with a lovely feel," she said as pupils broke into a chorus of "happy birthday" during assemblies.

"It's a really caring school and we do our very best for the kids every day. Everyone will do anything to help each other.

"Why wouldn't you want to stay? It's more like fun every day.

"The kids can tell you anything and they do. They're all great. I treat them like my own."

Mrs Swann believes she has earned the respect of the youngsters *"just by giving them the same respect as I would an adult and not talking down to them"*.

Each of her eight children attended St Albans Catholic High, as well as many of her 20 grandchildren. And in September, one of her five great-grandchildren will start attending the school.

Of the students, she said: *"They have all said 'happy birthday' to me and we had a special Mass at the chapel, which was full.*

"The Catholic ethos is still really important in schools - it's just about caring for each other and doing what you can for humanity."

Advice and a Slice

Advice and a Slice is now in full swing here at St. Albans. Being well attended by Years 9 through to 6th Form students.

The fantastic range of guest speakers visiting us during lunchtime on Wednesdays so far have included Suffolk Highways, BT, Suffolk New College, Otley College, Network for East Anglian Collaborative Outreach (neaco) and AIM - Apprenticeships.

Thank you to:

Stuart Heald of Suffolk Highways giving a very informative talk as a Chartered Engineer. Explaining to our students the different career routes that may be taken to achieve this role.

Stephen Johnson of BT. Giving an insight of his careers gaining a degree at University of Hull and how he progressed through BT to achieve his role as lead researcher into 5G network convergence.

Suffolk New College & Otley College Team – Games Design & Forensics

Games Design - not just about playing games but also how to develop ideas and learn the basics of design. Moving on to consider the programmes themselves looking at animation, art design, programming and sound.

Forensics - This study programme provides students with the underpinning knowledge and vocational skills for forensic science and criminal investigation. Designed to introduce learners to the foundations of knowledge in traditional sciences and criminal investigation including; biology, chemistry, physics, and crime scene analysis. The programme and teaching resources have been selected by experts with experience in the forensic science industry.



Network for East Anglian Collaborative Outreach (neaco)

Students were given practical advice on writing a CV enabling them to advertise themselves so that employers will hopefully want to meet with them. The Including what a CV should look like, the content of their CV- do's and don'ts, submitting CV to employers – do's and don'ts. Each student went away with a CV information sheet.



Apprenticeships (AIM) - Lily Sinclair

Once again our students were fully engaged as they were guided through what an apprenticeship is. The different types of apprenticeships available and what sectors in the world of work can they find an apprenticeship. Asking many questions.

University - Year 13

Year 13 students have been busy completing their UCAS applications, more than 50% of the year group have already submitted. Students are already in receipt of offers and interview invitations. We have organised mock pharmacy interviews (MMIs) for 5 students, and Medical MMIs for 4 students. Every student with an invitation for interview, will be offered a mock interview in school.

Year 12 – Mock Interviews

All Year 12 student have also experienced a **mock interview**, with a local employer this term.

Each student received verbal and written feedback on performance.

Interviewers commented on how exceptional the Year 12s were and how knowledgeable they are about their futures.

Year 12 – Work Experience week commences on Monday 9th December.

Members of staff look forward to visiting them in the workplace.

Be aware of key issues and how to discuss them with your children so they know how to stay safe online




If your child is using social networking apps check their profile and privacy settings, making sure they are not sharing personal or private information with people they do not know

Tips to get the best out of smart tech >>

It's estimated that one in five homes in the UK use a smart speaker. As children are using devices at a younger age, it's important to consider setting controls on the devices they use.



How can smart speakers help?

Smart speakers can connect to a range of apps to allow you to:

- Stream music
- Play voice-based games
- Set reminders
- Shop online
- Support children with reading and other key skills

What do you need to watch out for?

Use of your personal information

Many of these devices are **always quietly listening** and collecting data to be more helpful but it's important to be aware of how this information is stored.

Make sure to check your privacy settings on the account that controls your device and set these to a level you are happy with.

Hidden costs

Be aware that if you are connecting your device to other apps and devices, **there may be a subscription fee to pay** and connected devices tend to be more expensive.

Streaming music and making purchases

If your device is not set up with parental controls your child **may be able to play music with explicit lyrics** or make unwanted purchases.

Changing interactions with tech

There is a concern that home assistants may change the way children interact with others, in conversation or simply making requests.

It's important to direct children to be polite when using the devices and to get involved if they are having conversations with the device.



Top tips to remember when setting up your smart speaker



Speak to your kids about online safety – When introducing the smart speaker, sit down with your kids and share the rules on how they should use it. Remind them not to use inappropriate language when communicating with the smart speaker.

Check the basics – Does the app allow you to create children's accounts? What privacy settings are available? Can you set two-factor authentication to protect the product from hacks?

Set parental controls – Review and set controls to filter specific types of content kids could access. You can also set parental controls on your broadband to limit their access to inappropriate content.

Understand how smart speakers work – Take time to scan the device's manual and the company's site to get more information about features that can support your child particularly if they have any special needs.

Use strong passwords – Use well-protected passwords for you and your kids to avoid potential hackers.

Keep your software up to date – Companies release security updates and features so it's a good rule to stay on top of these updates.

Mute your speakers – To control what your smart speakers hear, it's to mute the device when you're not using it.

Review your voice and audio interactions – You can control what is shared. With some smart speakers, you are able to review your voice interactions, delete or turn off auto-saving of interactions altogether.
