It is the time of year when families are planning their summer holidays. So a reminder that we cannot, and do not, authorise term-time absences for holidays, visits to family abroad, birthday treats, etc.

If you do remove your child from school without authorisation then you will be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice (fine) in the first instance. Any subsequent such absence will lead to a referral for prosecution, which has heavy penalties of around $\pounds 1000$ per parent per child.

Year 13 Visit to the Houses of Parliament and Bank of England

14 of our Economics B students enjoyed a visit to London, this is what they wrote about it.

We had a really interesting and enjoyable day in London, taking one of the new trains from Ipswich to Liverpool St, and then using the underground to get to Westminster.

Houses of Parliament

Firstly, we went through security in Westminster. Many students were searched as part of their routine precautions. We were then led to a tour guide within Westminster Hall as she explained the history of the building and how parliament developed. Afterwards we followed the tour guide to the central lobby, in which members of the Opposition and members of the Governing Party could be together in one hall. The central lobby splits the building into two where one hall led to the Commons and one hall led to the Lords. We were led to the Commons Chamber. The current chamber was rebuilt after the Blitz by the architect Sir Giles Gilbert Scott. Its benches, as well as other furnishings are green in colour. We were all surpised by how small it is. The benches face each other with the governing party on one side and the Opposition on the other.





Soon after we were led to the Lords chamber and the role of the Lords was explained. The furnishings there are predominated decorated in red and it is much grander than the Commons. The Queen has a huge gold-leaf chair.

After our tour we met Tom Hunt MP in the Central Lobby from where he took us to a private meeting room and discussed his plans for Ipswich. These included ways of keeping the Orwell bridge open, possibly by the introduction of wind barriers, to avoid its frequent closure and resulting congestion.

He is also very concerned about education.

Bank of England Museum

As we entered we were screened once again. Once we entered we walked through several rooms with displayed the history of the Bank of England. Some of the displays showed the currency over time and others involved activities such as controlling inflation. We were also able to pick up a real gold bar which was very heavy, it was held securely in a case so that no-one could steal it.

Once we had passed through this section we were taken in to a cinema room in which a Bank of England employee explained the history and current role of the Bank of England. She explained that the Bank had switched to polymer notes because they are harder to counterfeit and are also environmentally friendly as the polymer can be re-used after shredding unlike paper bank notes. We then watched several videos which explained the role of money in the economy. She also explained what quantitative easing is and asked us questions, this concluded our tour and we took a short walk back to Liverpool St Station.
